### USDA to require HPAI test for moving dairy across state lines

The USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) <u>announced additional actions</u> to further protect the U.S. livestock industry from the threat posed by highly pathogenic H5N1 avian influenza (HPAI).

As detailed in a Federal Order, APHIS will require the following measures, effective Monday, April 29:

- Mandatory Testing for Interstate Movement of Dairy Cattle: Prior to interstate movement, dairy cattle are required to receive a negative test for Influenza A virus at an approved National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory and adhere to conditions specified by APHIS in forthcoming guidance.
- Mandatory Reporting: Laboratories and state veterinarians must report positive Influenza A serology diagnostic results and nucleic acid detection diagnostic results (e.g. PCR or genetic sequencing) in livestock to USDA APHIS.

While taking additional actions, USDA's announcement also emphasized the agency has not found changes to the virus that would make it more transmissible to humans and between people. While cases among humans in direct contact with infected animals are possible, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) believes that the current risk to the public remains low.

Additionally, USDA continues to see affected cows recover after supported care with little to no associated mortality, and is working with other stakeholders to emphasize the <u>importance biosecurity plays</u> in limiting disease spread for all livestock and poultry.

Meanwhile, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) released an <u>update</u> on the ongoing work to ensure continued effectiveness of the federal-state milk safety system. Based on current information and

research, FDA and USDA continue to believe that the commercial milk supply is safe because of both the pasteurization process and the required diversion or destruction of milk from sick cows.

### **USDA** accepting applications for Colombia trade mission

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is accepting applications from U.S. exporters for an agribusiness <u>trade mission</u> to Bogotá, Colombia on Aug. 13-15 with Undersecretary for Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs Alexis Taylor.

USDA requests online applications to be completed here by May 3.

"Colombia represents a top-tier food and agricultural export destination for American farmers, ranchers and processors," said Taylor in the April 19 announcement. "As the second-most-populous country in South America, Colombia enjoys highly favorable demographics, coupled with 20 years of continuous economic growth, which saw a 36-percent increase in the median household income."

Colombia is the largest South American market for U.S. agricultural products and the seventh-largest market for U.S. food and beverage exports globally, USDA noted. Since the U.S.-Colombia Trade Promotion Agreement was implemented in 2012, U.S. agricultural exports to Colombia have grown 237 percent, reaching a record \$3.7 billion in 2023.

While in Bogotá, U.S. agribusiness representatives will meet with potential importers from across Colombia and receive market briefings from USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) and local/regional industry trade experts. The mission will also include engagements with USDA leadership, site visits in Bogotá and the surrounding area, and multiple networking opportunities.
